

Rollingwood Park



Nestled in the neighborhood of Rollingwood, this park is a favorite for playdates. The park is within walking distance to the Rollingwood municipal building (located at 403 Nixon Drive) and offers two playscapes, one for preschoolers and a larger one for children five and older. There is a swing set for infants and “big kids”. A small open field adjacent to the playground offers an open area for running. One fun feature is an updated version of an old playground favorite, a see-saw. The larger playscape has many features that challenge the big kids balance and strength including a climbing wall, big slide and a bridge.

Although there is not a bathroom in immediate sight, restrooms can be found up the stairs that lead to the athletic fields. Also, there is no shade over the play area, however, a nearby large pavilion is a great place to get out of the sun and have snack time. This park is a great place for an early morning play-date or for an evening family picnic under the pavilion.

Reed Park



Reed Park lies in the heart of Tarrytown at 2600 Pecos Street, between Windsor and Exposition. Reed Park offers a ton of activities for families to explore, play, and swim. The park has a pool and several areas to play, including a large playscape and set of swings. The playscape is not shaded, but there are several shaded areas under the large trees around the park. There is an infant swing set area and a small pavilion that offers some shade on one side of the playground. Older kids can hike the trails and explore the small creek that flows nearby. One interesting feature of the park is a large stone structure across the driveway where kids love to use their imagination and play. (The structure used to be an old lime kiln used in the 1800’s for the construction of stone houses in the neighborhood.) One draw to the park is an accessible port-a-potty for little girls and expecting moms.

Circle C Park



There is a hidden gem in Circle C Ranch known as Metropolitan Park, located at 6301 W. Slaughter Lane. It is a little known secret that is a favorite of the moms of Circle C. The playscapes are directly under large oak trees that offer shade year round. There are two playscapes and a row of “big kid” swings with one infant swing. The park is bordered by soccer fields so the kids can run free without the worry of cars. The park is patrolled by security and has several benches for parents to rest and relax. There is also one dome-shaped, metal climbing structure that kids love to climb.
